"Freight Train" is an American folk song written by <u>Elizabeth Cotten</u> in the early 20th century, and popularized during the <u>American folk revival</u> and British <u>skiffler</u> period of the 1950s and 1960s. By Cotten's own account in the 1985 <u>BBC</u> series *Down Home*, she composed "Freight Train" as a teenager (sometime between 1906 and 1912), inspired by the sound of the trains rolling in on the tracks near her home in <u>North Carolina</u>
